Household of Anne, Duchess of York 1660-?1671

The household of the Duchess of York was paid for out of the Duke's revenues. Early in their marriage, the Duke had given the Duchess an allowance of \pounds 5,000 per annum. In March 1666 an additional sum of \pounds 7,827 3s 1d was assigned by the Duke "being for the maintenance of all the servants and attendants, belonging to my dear wife, as well as for their salaryes, wages and board wages, as for the liveryes and other charges belonging to them, and also for the charges of her stables, comprehending the medicine and shoeing of her horses, repayres of coaches, saddles, harness, &c."
