Ladies of the Bedchamber c. 1728-1786

By 1728, three ladies of the Bedchamber served. The Countess of Sussex made £400, the other two, £300 per annum apiece, which became the standard remuneration for all subsequent ladies after her death in 1730. The Countess of Barrymore also received £400 per annum.¹
