

**Household of Frederick Lewis, Prince of Wales 1729-1751
(omits officers of the Duchy of Cornwall)**

Frederick's household was paid for out of the hereditary revenues of the Prince of Wales and an allowance of £24,000 per annum paid out of the Civil List. This was raised following his marriage to Princess Augusta in 1736 to £50,000 per annum, and then in 1742 to £100,000 per annum. He also borrowed extensively from private German sources.¹

Grooms 1729-1751

In 1729 two grooms made £60 per annum apiece with three more at £53 10s apiece. By 1735 a head groom made £60 per annum and five other grooms made £24 5s apiece. By the establishment of December of that year their number had risen to six and their remuneration to £53 10s. There were seven grooms at this remuneration in 1741, falling to six by 1745.¹

Assistant Grooms 1729-c. 1750

In 1729 one assistant groom made £26 per annum. By 1735 three assistant grooms made £24 5s. According to the establishment of December 1735, the first assistant made £29 5s, the other two, £24 5s each per annum. Five were listed at Lady Day 1738, but by 1741 their number had fallen to two.¹
